24/25	Apologies for non-attendance:- Councillor Mrs. L. Harrison	
25/25	<p>Public Forum:- Four members of public in attendance. Patrick Balcombe raised issues with public rights of way in the village, as per email sent to the Parish Council, noting all issues have been reported to Cornwall Council. He detailed the issues in further detail which had been reported including broken footpath signs. Chairman advised the Parish Council ultimately are only responsible for grasscutting maintenance However, we would review paperwork received and send to the appropriate Officers of Cornwall Council Action: Clerk/Chairman.</p> <p>Simon Rix reported on Mr. Clive Ould's planning application on the agenda this evening. Mr. Ould just wants somewhere to live, his mother owns the house and is in full time care and the Council are now taking the property to pay for the care. 27/25	<p>Monthly Cornwall Councillor Report:- Report received from Cornwall Councillor P. Guest as follows:-</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Happy New Year everyone, I hope you are all returning rested and refreshed from the Festive Break and Santa brought you what you asked for. As usual over Christmas, the number of committee meetings held in Truro tailed off, which has tended in the past to give me the opportunity to get out and about more in the Division. It is the time of the year that I always look forward to, visiting and supporting all the Christmas fairs and functions laid on by our various community groups. Sadly, this year due to my temporary health issues, I have not been able to attend as many of them as I would have liked to, but, reassuringly, I am told that in general, they were well attended and I hope that they raised valuable funds for the groups involved. • We are now back into the full swing of Council business, I have been at all the meetings that I have needed to attend and although I have not been as visible within the Division recently, I have been able to keep on top of my local work. • A few items of note have taken place in Truro, and here is a quick update on what has been going on. The main debate this month has been on the devolution deal. 	

Although tinged with a certain amount of pragmatism, as in the Government intend to have us swallowed up in a Mayoral authority consisting of ourselves, Plymouth and Devon, a motion to resist this and ask for a standalone deal for Cornwall was put forward. Although I was broadly supportive, those eagle-eyed amongst you will have noticed that I abstained on this vote. My main objection was Clause 4 which stated that Cornwall commits to never engaging in talks with neighbouring authorities on proposed cross border deals. This, in theory, would constrain us on talking to Plymouth about the Tamar crossing for example, even though we hold joint responsibility for this. The motion was carried, and despite our Labour MPs promising a tailor-made deal for Cornwall within 100 days of election, it seems inevitable that we will tagged on to a Devon and Plymouth Mayoral authority at a later date, and I personally would rather be sat at the table thrashing out a fair deal for the Duchy as opposed to being fed scraps as an afterthought once they have agreed a settlement with Devon and Plymouth.

- Another point of major concern is this year's budget. We received assurances from Westminster that this year's settlement would be on a par with last years and we calculated the budget accordingly. Sadly, 2 days before Christmas, we got our settlement figure which was £5.2 million short. A double whammy followed shortly after, when again, despite promises that the extra bill for the increases National Insurance Employer Contributions incurred by Cornwall Council would be covered by the Government, their settlement figure was £1m light. Having calculated our budget on the promised figures from Westminster, we have now suddenly had to find an extra £6.2, yes, I will repeat that figure, £6.2 million of savings. For savings, read peoples jobs and services.
- Newquay airport is still subject to ongoing negotiations. Contrary to what you read in the press and on Facebook, it is not being sold off to have houses built on it! A deal is not far off, there are still some talks going on about the financing of the deal. As and when a deal is agreed, I will write in more detail on it.
- Work is currently underway regarding the new Governments planning reforms. Currently the detail is vague apart from the threat to impose building targets on Cornwall, massively increasing the number of houses that we will have to build, regardless of the constraints of building materials, workforce and land. There will be implications on planning committees and Neighbourhood plans. There was a meeting/briefing for Parish Councils on the 27th of January, which was be an opportunity for you to ask questions and raise concerns.
- On a brighter note, a couple of weeks ago I had the pleasure of attending the quarterly meeting of the Cornwall Youth Council in the main Chamber at New County Hall. The meeting was organised and run very efficiently and professionally by the young people and both I and our local MP Noah Law fielded and answered some searching questions from the Council.
- The last scheduled meeting of the Children's and Families Overview and Scrutiny Committee of which I am the Vice Chair is being held in March and we have agreed to shorten our statutory agenda and allow the second half of the meeting to be taken over and chaired by the Youth Council. It is heartening to see these young people taking an interest in politics, they are the next generation, they're keen, astute and certainly keep me on my toes.
- Moving on to local matters, I am glad to see that we are nearly there with our new link road. I am hoping that the current diversion will be the last major piece of disruption. I am confident that the ends will justify the means.
- I am going to finish on a good news story.

	<p>You should all have received an invitation to the grand launch of the Bugle Library of Things (BLOT) van at the Village Hall on the 12th February 2025. We managed to secure £94,300 towards this project from the Community Levelling Up Fund, which was part of the previous Governments Shared Prosperity Fund. A lot of hard work has gone into this and I am sure that it will be of great benefit serving not only Bugle but the whole of the Clay Country. I have circulated BLOT's business plan which will give you an idea of the good community works that we envisage being carried out as well as the aspirations to extend the service and build on its success. The 'ribbon cutting' on the 12th will be a celebration of the start of the project, I am currently organising press coverage of the event and hope to see as many of you there as possible. 	<p>Email and information received from Patrick Balcombe in respect of Public Rights of Way advising as a resident of Roche and a volunteer Parish Warden with the Ramblers, I am writing to inform the Parish Council of some issues with public rights of way in the village. I plan to attend the Public Forum at the next Parish Council meeting on 3rd February 2025 to present the attached report of issues with Public Rights of Way. Additionally, I would like to inform the council of two Definitive Map Modification Order (DMMO) applications which I have submitted to Cornwall Council, a description of the rights of way applied for are attached. I would appreciate it if you could pass these documents to the relevant members of the footpath committee for their review prior to the meeting. Update received from David Edwards in respect of the report which he believes is excellent and very comprehensive. The only few comments are that the locked gate at Holy Well has been a problem before. The last time Councillor P. Kent managed to sort it out and it was open again for a while. 412/26/1 The overgrown footpath to Tregoss Mill. The previous Environment Warden cut this footpath to the line on the map about 15 years ago and then made a bridge across the stream. Sometime later, Natural England found out about the bridge and contacted the Parish Council to have it removed, which it was. The path was then not really usable and became overgrown, so probably not worth clearing again, unless there is a means of crossing the stream. 412/7/1 Missing/broken signposts. 43/25	<p>Field at Trezaise for Discussion:- Councillor P. Kent reported on the field for sale up at Trezaise. He had had an interesting telephone call from an Architect asking about the field. Councillor P. Kent did not let much on but did mention the Parish Council were interested but it was put on the open market. The architect was surprised – suggested that as if it was for a community project i.e. environmental/good for the community, the Council like those kinds of projects. He was involved in a project at Veryan, where the local parish bought 2 fields from Cornwall Council for that very thing and the Council were all for it. In short, he thinks the Parish Council should push this. The Architect would send some pointers etc on the project at Veryan, if interested.</p> <p>Councillor M. Taylor said he believes if we worked up a specific project it would be worth pushing. The history of site is it was proposed by Cornwall Council for affordable homes during the Neighbourhood Plan process. We looked hard at affordable (i.e. social) homes demand in the village. Because there is already a high % and the clay villages are not hugely popular unless there is a local connection (for most people it is better to live in one of the towns with more jobs and facilities) Ocean Housing told us that although there is a theoretical need, that is more reflective of general need in mid Cornwall for affordable than Roche specific, and they have enough housing coming vacant each year to meet actual demand – to point they would not consider building in Roche. Councillor M. Taylor said he thinks that is still the case – if affordable is built it will be filled of course given the waiting lists but by people whose first preference would be elsewhere. As a result of this Cornwall Council also withdrew their proposal to build affordable homes on this site. The Neighbourhood Plan concluded housing should not be built in Trezaise anyway reflecting strong local concern about the dangerous road conditions and lack of pavement, and disconnect from local services. However, we said this should be reviewed (as part of a new Neighbourhood Plan process) if/when bypass built. So, a) not clear there is local demand for affordable on that site nor that it would be best site (we have others allocated and not yet built that were preferred) – though could be reviewed in next Neighbourhood Plan which is pretty much due with road and new local plan. Councillor M. Taylor had pointed out all the above to Cornwall Council on behalf of Parish Council as requested at the last meeting, and that they had promised to defend old Neighbourhood Plan until new decisions taken – hence was withdrawn from sale. It was a different dept proposing the sale (estates) and they had used the very old pre-app advice that predated the Neighbourhood Plan and reflected the original Cornwall Council plan to build affordable homes. The caveat re us buying it cheaply is the new road is going in now and the plans for Roche in flux. So, Cornwall Council might want to wait, but if a really good community proposal came forward, we might have a chance of agreeing a transfer to the Parish at very low cost and in Councillor M. Taylor's view this is well worth pursuing to achieve a good outcome such as a community orchard.</p> <p>There was a general discussion all supportive of it being a site suitable for a Parish Council Natural Environment Community Project. It could have e.g. wildflowers, orchard, connect up to walk to the playing fields and football field.</p>	

	<p>Chairman agreed the Parish should approach Cornwall Council with a proposal. He requested someone(s) to take this project on with the support of everyone else. Councillor B. Kretowicz and P. Kent agreed to lead the project together and report to the Parish Council Action: Councillors B. Kretowicz and P. Kent.</p> <p>Councillor M. Taylor suggested the Chairman sending an email to Louise Wood of Cornwall Council (cc Adam Birchall) to thank her for her role in suspending the sale and stating the Parish had made a bid for the land to deliver a community environmental project which is being worked up, and asking for her advice and support in how to progress the Parish acquiring the land at low cost for this purpose, noting the Parish is working up a plan but not wanting to put in huge effort and cost getting advice if it is a non-starter.
