314/21	<p>Public Forum:- One member of Public in attendance, nothing to raise.</p> <p>Mr. Paul Bateman, Managing Director of Influence Planning Solutions attended to address the Parish Council in respect of a proposed forthcoming planning application to explain the proposal, its policy context and the outcome he would appreciate from the Parish Council. He summarised the position in a document forwarded that had been circulated to Councillors.</p> <p>The proposal is for two single dwellings and he has looked at the Roche Parish Council Neighbourhood Plan. This would tie in with Tremodrett and Higher Town. Following the Neighbourhood Plan this site would give the Parish to have some input and in terms of how they can achieve the development. Realistically they are looking to achieve some exlempary properties. He does believe there is scope for larger properties in the parish as well as affordable properties. Any feedback he would be happy to receive from Councillors or the Parish Council as a whole.</p> <p>Councillor G. Rowe reported normally outside of development envelope it is affordable but understands why they want to do this on this site.</p> <p>Councillor M. Taylor believes they would struggle to make a case for this as effectively this is in the open countryside. Unless there is an acceptional reason, he believes personally he would struggle to get a recommendation from Planning Officers as he does not believe there is anything in the Development Plan. Given the nature of the lanes in this area with additional traffic movement with further development this may be a consideration.</p> <p>Chairman asked if they had been in contact with local neighbours in the area as they would need to be approached. It was noted that the Parish Council are the first contact made with regards to this proposal. Monthly Cornwall Councillor Report:- Councillor P. Guest reported as follows:-

- In no particular order, here's a break down of what I have been up to in the last month.
- First of all, my thanks to the Parish Council for organising a well run, well attended, poignant and moving Remembrance Day Service. It was an honour to lay a wreath on behalf of Cornwall Council and I was particularly impressed with the amount of youngsters who attended. The wooden crosses looked impressive on the march up to the Church and John Wood assured me that the collection of colours and wreathes at the Altar is always chaotic.
- The skate park is moving forward at an impressive rate, in the Youth Club report (further down the agenda), I touch on the possibility of 'street art' to brighten the area up and am happy to elaborate on where we are with the project.
- Frustratingly, I lost the Tregoss traveller site appeal, permission was granted by 8 votes to 2. A couple of the committee approached me afterwards commenting that they had no choice but to grant permission because of the wording in the Councils current Travellers policy. Although, it puts a number on the amount of permitted sites within Cornwall, there is no mention or requirement as to where in the county they have to be sited. Roche and Clay Country as a whole carry a disproportionate amount of the sites (estimates of up to 85% of the total are in Clay Country tend to back that up). This is not fair, but currently in line with policy. Dick Cole, myself and a nearby Parish Clerk are working to bring about change to this policy. It is a sensitive area and we are being guided and advised by a couple of the councils legal officers. Because it is such a sensitive subject, I declined an interview on BBC's Spotlight programme following the hearing.
- Moving on to enforcement in general, I have been tasked by your Chairman to supply a monthly report to the Parish Council on the current state of play with each case. I have compiled a spreadsheet and am working with someone in the Enforcement Office who has agreed to assist me. At the time of writing this report, I have not had the updated spreadsheet back, if it arrives prior to the meeting, I will report and distribute it, failing that, I will submit a written report for circulation on receipt. This will become a permanent item on the agenda and moving forward, I will be challenging the enforcement team if it appears that they are dragging their heels.
- Following a conversation with the Chairman on a site visit last week, I have asked Steve Gudge who is the project manager for the A30 Link Road build for a report on the current state of play. As with the enforcement report, at the time of writing, I have not received it back. Again, if it is available, I will report on it at the meeting or circulate a written report to all Councillors on receipt.
- Last week I attended and helped out on the St Austell Town Councils stand at the Climate Change Festival. I was actually thanked by a member of Extinction Rebellion for what we are doing, I am not sure if she knew who I actually was, but, it was a bizarre experience.
- As you know, I am now Vice-Chair of the Cornwall Adult Education Board. My main focus in this role will be to improve the availability of skills based courses in order for people to improve their employability, either finding a job in the first place or make a career change or improve their prospects within their current job. As a service, we deliver arts and crafts and holiday Spanish very well, but I feel there is a need to develop our practical skills offer.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • I have been doing a lot of work as a part of both the Children's and Families Scrutiny Committee and the Health and Wellbeing Board. Strategy documents have been submitted and approved by Full Council. They are detailed documents, but, at the heart of them is the aspiration to deliver better health care and give every child the best possible start in life. • You will be aware of the public consultations underway regarding the leisure centres, the outdoor education centres and the music education hub. Please ignore the headlines, they are just that, consultations, we have no plans to shut anything down. There have been expressions of interest in taking over the running of the leisure centres, these are currently commercially sensitive, but the hope is that they can remain open. Porthpean Outdoor Education Centre is a facility that we know well, again a public consultation is underway. The centre is under utilised at the moment, but has great potential to be profitable. Along with other local Councillors, I am campaigning for it to remain open with the proviso that it is used to its maximum potential. • These consultations have had to come about due to a £70 million shortfall in the Councils budget and an alarming increase in the cost of adult social care. The previous administration drew on reserves to balance it. This could not go on and we have had to make some tough decisions, but, have managed to produce a balanced budget. The main headline is that we will be increasing Council tax by 1.99% plus a 1% increase in the Adult Social Care precept. It will work out at approximately 96p per week for a band D house. • Despite all of the above, my main job is and will remain supporting and representing the good people of Roche. I have quite a bit of casework and that is where I devote the bulk of my time and energy. I try to make myself as available as possible, but, as always, please get in touch if you or any of your parishioners have an issue or even a good idea or suggestion. <p>Chairman thanked Cornwall Councillor P. Jones)</p> <p>Email received from Treverbyn Parish Council with their comments on this application and their previous planning application:-</p> <p>PA21/10964 – Mr. Peter Larwood, Imerys Minerals Ltd – Application for the progressive removal of sections of the Goonbarrow China Clay Minerals Waste Tip for export from the site as secondary aggregates. The scheme involves some material processing involving the installation and operation of crushing and screening equipment as well as progressive restoration of the worked areas. Application similar to approval PA20/01016 (e.g. HGVs turning left out of the site transporting such aggregates to Fowey Docks), but also seeks permission to supply secondary aggregates to certain infrastructure developments e.g. A30 and A391 road developments which will entail vehicles turning right out of the site to access such projects, Goonbarrow China Clay Works, Higher Bugle, Bugle – We support subject to these conditions being met – details of the proposed hours of work, environmental concerns (i.e. dust, noise) to nearest neighbour and lifespan of this. It has been drawn to our attention there is a local resident who has not been consulted and the crusher is very close to their property and what implications can be made on the impact of this to them. We would also request no access through Roche Village at all once the new road is open, this should be a condition of the application. We have ongoing issues on HGV lorries travelling through the village and spilling loads, especially at junctions and roundabouts which have been reported and documented. 307/21	<p>Vision Zero South West – Successful Grant Application – Next Steps:- Clerk reported the Parish Council had been successful in their application for a road safety grant and based on the information provided the full amount of the application of £10,000 has been approved.</p> <p>Clerk had followed up with St. Stephen in Brannel Parish Council who advised it is not a simple process to obtain the flashing speed signs. Firstly the Parish cannot use any telegraph poles to put the devices on and most street furniture will not hold the weight, especially if you go for the solar powered devices. They have had to ask Cornwall Highways to install 16 posts at a cost of £3,000 to get permission for the devices to go up. They suggested speaking to Rachael Tatlow of Cormac before doing anything else.</p>	

	<p>The company they are using for the devices is SWARCO and she could not supply a price as they are bespoke made and depending on what you want will depend on the cost. To give a ball park figure they charge around £18k for 6 devices. 308/21	<p>Double Yellow Lines on Tregarrick Road, Roche:- Clerk reported an email had been received from Cormac as follows:- It is anticipated that the design fee will be £6,200 including the statutory consultation and the making of the Traffic Regulation Order. The works costs will vary somewhere between £1k and £1,400 depending on the nature of the restrictions. Options are no waiting at any time throughout the identified extents, or having a section of single yellow line included, which needs posts/signs (hence the additional expense). Whilst it is too late to combine a separately funded scheme here with the latest China Clay Community Network Panel Scheme, the Design Team can currently see no reason why a scheme could not be progressed early in the new year, which would be in advance of the next round of Community Network Panel Schemes. Does the Parish Council want to proceed with a self-funded scheme based on the costs below, rather than await consideration under the next Community Network Panel Programme? 309/21	<p>New Estate for Tregothnan Estates including Section 106 Funding and Play Area Discussion:- Chairman reported a meeting had been held with Darran Goldby of Tregothnan Estates regarding the new estate. Detailed plans should come to the Parish Council around March/April 2022. Park on the new development would need to be discussed. Section 106 funding would be available but figures are not known at the present time. Tregothnan would like to see the money coming to the village.</p> <p>Email received from Cornwall Council – In circumstances where an off-site contribution in lieu of, on-site provision is acceptable to the Council, a tariff-based approach will be applied, as set out in Appendix 2 of the Housing SPD 2020. In accordance with the NPPF, the off-site contribution tariff is set at a 'broadly equivalent' value to the cost of providing on-site affordable housing. The amount to be paid will be the equivalent 'cost to the developer' of providing the affordable units on-site. The cost will be equivalent to the difference between the open market value of a dwelling and the price that a Registered Provider would pay for the dwelling if it was provided on-site.</p>	

	<p>The amount of off-site contribution payable per dwelling is set in a tariff in Appendix 2 (Housing SPD 2020), applicable in each of the three different Local Housing Allowance (LHA) areas in Cornwall. The tariff should be multiplied by the number of dwellings which would have been required on-site using the percentage requirement for the relevant value zone set out in Policy 8 of the Local Plan. Off-site financial contribution payable = Tariff for LHA area x number of units which would have been required on-site. The Council requires the timing of payments for off-site contributions to be made at the same pace as open market dwellings are sold and/or at the equivalent rate that on-site provision would have been required. Ideally the Enabling Activity Fee is to be provided prior to the commencement of development to allow the Council to begin enabling activities to find an alternative site for delivery. The remainder will then be required at certain points throughout the construction of the rest of the site; with the entire obligation required prior to overall completion of the site. The Council will seek to spend the money as locally as possible to the site which made the contribution. Typically, the money is ring-fenced locally for the first three years; in rural areas this is normally within the parish or adjoining parish or in towns this may be on sites within the town or well-related to the town. In some circumstances it may be the Community Network Area that offers the most realistic chance of the money being spent locally. If the money cannot be spent within three years it then cascades out to the wider Community Network Area for a further three years. After which time, if it cannot be spent, it can be spent anywhere in Cornwall. Contributions made for the Enabling Activity Fee or that are solely a proportional 'fraction' of a unit can be spent anywhere in Cornwall.
